

Lists

HTML allows us to create two forms of lists:

- Ordered Lists:** These are numbered by the browser when they are displayed; and
Unordered Lists: These are displayed with bullet-points.

The Tags


Beginning tag	End tag	Function (what they do)
		These tags mark the beginning and end of an unordered list (with bullet points).
		These tags mark the beginning and end of an ordered list (with numbers).
		Marks the beginning and end of an item in a list.

Unordered Lists

```

<head>
<title>Unordered List</title>
</head>

<body>
<ul>
    <li>Item 1</li>
    <li>Item 2</li>
    <li>Item 3</li>
</ul>

</body>
</html>
```




Ordered Lists

```
<html>
<head>
<title>Ordered List</title>
</head>

<body>
<ol>
    <li>This is the first item</li>
    <li>This is the second item</li>
    <li>This is the third item</li>
</ol>

</body>
</html>
```



Lists may contain text and/or hyperlinks to other sites, or to other pages within the same site.

Some examples:


Unordered List

Here's how I might put some of my friends into an unordered list:

```

<head>
<title>List of my friends</title>
</head>

<body>
<h1>Here are some of my friends</h1>
<ul>
    <li>Amy</li>
    <li>Tony D</li>
    <li>Gemma</li>
    <li>Jo</li>
    <li>Holly</li>
    <li>Mandeep</li>
    <li>Joshua</li>
    <li>Alison</li>
    <li>Sumeyah</li>
    <li>Alph</li>
</ul>

</body>
</html>
```



Of course, I could make this more interesting with some colours, hyperlinks to their Web sites or Facebook pages... - but that's your job, when you create your version of the list!

... and here's an Ordered List:

<head>
<title>Steps to HTML</title>
</head>

<body>
<h1>The steps to writing successful HTML code</h1>

<ol>
<li>Make sure you know where to save your files ...
<li>... and what to <b>save as</b>!
<li>Find out about <b>title</b> and <b>body</b> tags
<li>Learn how to use some of the tags to <i>format your text</i>.
<li>Start to use pictures, and make the layout tidy
<li>Get some colour in there
<li>Learn about quotes and lists ...
<li>... and there's still more to come!
</ol>

It looks like this:
